FROM THE

REX BAKER

"I am Rex, and I am a sinner." I just want to establish that fact at the beginning of this letter. I once heard a wise preacher say "everybody is addicted to something." By this, he meant that each one of us has a personal struggle with sin and the flesh. While our struggles are not all the same, we all have a proverbial "thorn in the flesh", as the Apostle Paul calls it. Paul wrote that "there was given me a thorn in the flesh" to keep him from becoming too proud in this life.

The beauty is that Paul doesn't reveal the identity of his thorn. Therefore, we can each relate to having a "thorn". We all have that problem, that addiction, that nagging sin, that life issue that just won't go away even after we have prayed and sought God diligently.

At Gateway Rescue Mission, we hold an addiction recovery group meeting each Thursday evening. It gives the men in our New Life Program a safe place to talk about their "thorns." This meeting has become one of my favorite parts of the week.

A couple of months ago, we had a guy named Luke in our program. Luke looked like an extra from Friday the 13th and during a Thursday meeting he growled out "I love drugs and I hate people." Now, here is where I'm supposed to say that Luke found Jesus and his frown turned to a smile and now he loves people just fine. In reality, Luke left not long after that for the siren call of whatever drug has him bound.

However, for most of the guys in our recovery program, Thursday night has become their time to share what God is doing in their lives. Some talk a lot while others talk very little. Thorns are discussed such as alcohol, crystal meth, and cocaine.

Sometimes guys share that the thorn of improper sexual relationships led them back to drugs.

Here's what I've learned about the redemption of God being applied to our broken lives. If we create an atmosphere that values the love of Christ being shown toward the fallen, the fallen find that thing most difficult to grasp when battling thorns. That is, they discover salvation bestowed from a loving God lived out in fellowship with other broken and restored followers of Christ.

Our programmatic team of Forea Ford and Michael Sweet recently held a healing/prayer service in our chapel. The service lasted almost two hours with men coming forward seeking prayer through the working of the Holy Spirit. Somedays we have volunteers who show love through handing a plate of food to a stranger.

In most addiction support groups, a person typically begins speaking with the phrase "I'm Joe and I'm an alcoholic, or addict, or whatever." The idea is not that we must forever be reminded of our past deeds. Rather, we are stating that in our lowest sinfulness, we can today be reconciled to God and accepted by others.

Indeed, I am Rex and I am a sinner. The One who knew no sin died for the sins I committed on the worst day of my life. That holds for everyone who claims the name of Christ. May you experience the joy today of the One who died for you and makes it possible for us to live in harmony with other sinners redeemed by the blood of Christ.
